

Connecting iPad as a Display to Windows/Mac Computers

This tutorial covers how to connect your iPad to a Windows or Mac computer as an additional display. This allows you to run software normally run on your computer—but displayed on the iPad screen for stylus use. For example, I can connect my iPad to my PC computer and use my Apple Pen to create notes on OneNote. *Note: Recent Mac computers have Sidecar installed—use this software if you have a recent mac model.

STEP 1

To make this possible, you must use some sort of software that turns your iPad into another display. The software I used is called **Duet Display**. It is \$14.99 and works very well for its application. You don't have to use this SPECIFIC software, but it works well.

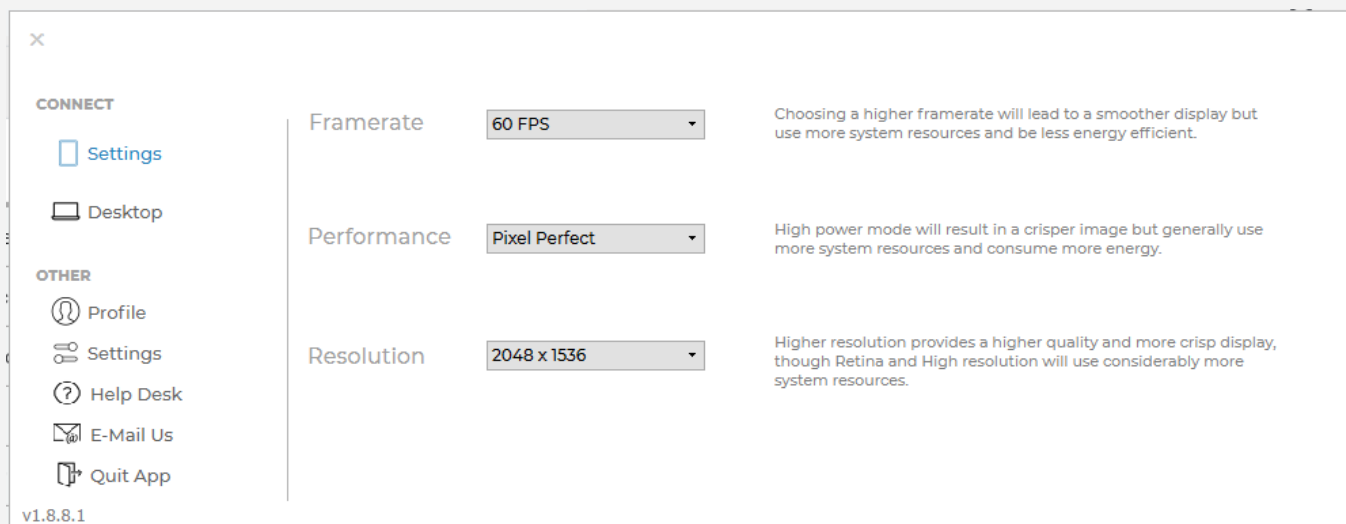
To begin, you must

- A) Download Duet Display onto your computer <https://www.duetdisplay.com/>
- B) Download Duet Display onto your iPad - search on app store

STEP 2

Open the application on **BOTH** your iPad and computer. Follow any prompts. You can connect your iPad using a wired or wireless connection. It is recommended to use a wired connection. Once you plug in your iPad, you should see it become an additional display.

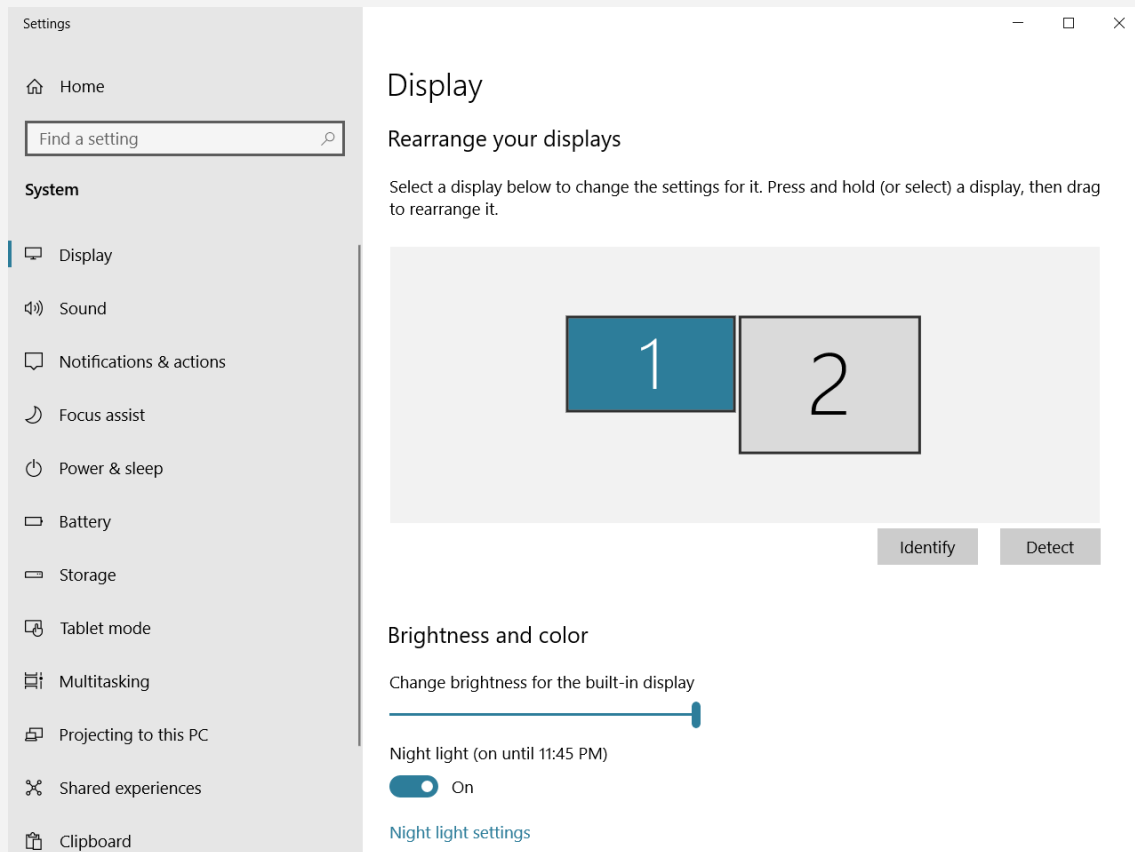
Settings Duet Display will show: Play around with the resolution to determine what your preference is.

STEP 3

If you want to change the display settings on your computer, navigate to the display settings. On Windows, it will look like the following image. Here, my computer is display 1, and my iPad is display 2. From here, it is recommended to have **Extend Your Display** on.



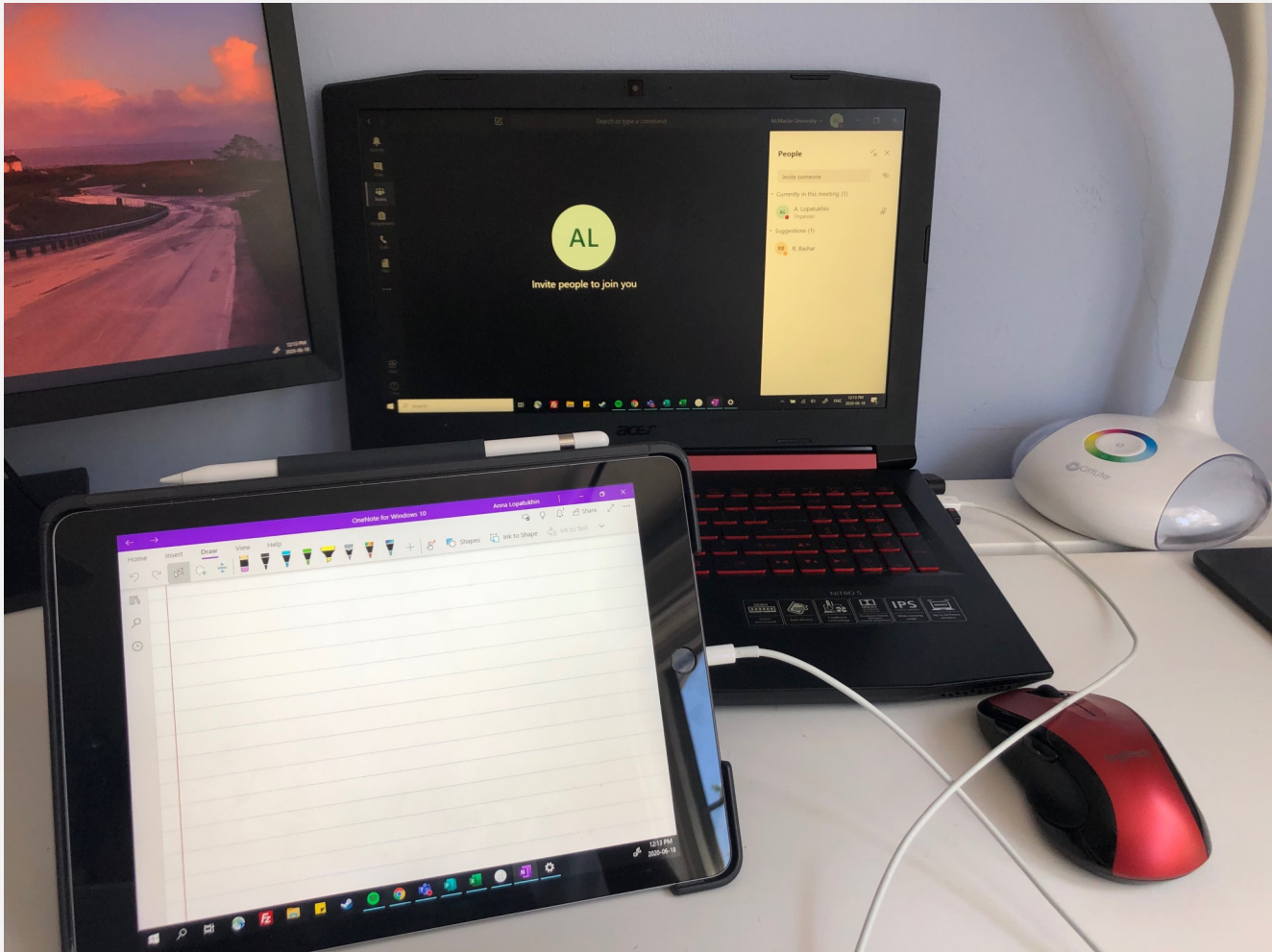
STEP 4

Now, you can open OneNote or your desired drawing app, and simply drag it over to your iPad the same way you would move any application or window.

STEP 5

Now, when you start your call on Teams, you can select to screenshare your app (i.e. OneNote) and use your iPad to annotate. The following is an image of my setup. I have my computer running the teams call, with OneNote open on my iPad to take live notes. I also have an extra monitor setup just in case I need more display space.
